#### Improving communications

The proposal to divide the branch into clusters was discussed. Thank you to all those who were unable to attend the meeting but responded via email... The overwhelming consensus was that the proposal was a good idea.

In a nutshell the aim is to improve communication within the Branch. To achieve this, Ross is updating the e-mail contact list. *Tower contacts please send an updated list of the email addresses of members of their tower to Ross as soon as possible*. Anyone who is not currently receiving the newsletter can contact Ross to be included on the list just in case they have not been included on the tower list. Each cluster will be asked to nominate a representative whose duties will be to produce a short annual report on the ringing activity in the cluster (which towers are ringing regularly, when and to what level). The representative will be the first point of contact for help with ringing matters – not necessarily to deliver but to communicate need. If help is not available locally the representative will liaise with the committee. It is more important that the representatives have communication skills rather than ringing skills. Ringers who ring min more than one tower would be one tower would be good candidates.

There is a lot of activity in the branch and the aim is to share it. Please use effort to report events, initiatives and achievements. If your tower is staging an event such as a

### Ted Hudson Memorial

A PLAQUE found at the bottom of a drawer, led to the hunt for information about Ted Hudson. Edward Hudson started bellringing at St John's, Sharow and became a member of the Yorkshire Association of Change Ringers in 1929.

He is fondly remembered as a stalwart of the Ripon bellringing community and the plaque came from a bench donated to Ted when he retired as Secretary to the Northern District of the Yorkshire Association (later the Cleveland and North Yorkshire Branch). The bench remained at St. John's and the plaque, long outlasting the bench, was passed to the Church Warden.

For over 40 years Ted had been a committed committee member of his local ringing association and a bell ringer at both St. John's and later at Ripon Cathedral. During this time he taught and encouraged many people including a group from the old Ripon St John College. He traveled the country, ringing bells and recording his exploits.

Following his death in 1979, an appeal was launched in the Ringing World in Ted's memory to buy a bell for Hutton Rudby. In 2017 another appeal was launched, this time to mark his grave which lies adjacent to St John's Church Tower. There is a lot of support to recognise Ted's work and to record his burial place. We are hoping to clean up and engrave a flower vase from his grave. At the YACR meeting at Aldborough, £90 was raised towards the appeal. ### In Memoriam: Alan Ball

ALAN BALL died peacefully on 9th April 2016, at the age of 88. At his request, he was cremated at Darlington in what was a private service followed by a small gathering at Stalling Busk where he had lived. A widower, he left a daughter and a son.

Alan was a regular ringer at St. Ostwald's Askrigg, becoming tower captain back in 1994, in the footsteps of Jack Metcalfe. During his 20 years as tower captain, Alan trained a number of local people to ring, some of whom have gone on to form a successful band that rings regularly at Aysgarth. Alan had a love and passion for bell ringing, yet in his later years as his health deteriorated he continued to ring for as long as he possibly could He was that kind of character. A regular ringer of the 4th and with a style that paid attention to detail, Alan reluctantly gave up ringing in 2014. He will be long remembered for his dedication to the tower at St. Oswald's Askrigg.

### Pat Everest of Masham

Pat passed away in October 2015 and is survived by her husband David and their three sons. Pat and David came from North London 29 years ago and moved to Fearby following a long association as penpal of a local farmer's wife, Pat soon became a very active member of several local organizations and continued her job as company secretary until her retirement. She was a member of the WI and Fearby Village Hall and rang tower and hand bells. Pat became a qualified and North Yorkshire Association in 1988. Pat was tower secretary and arranged Masham Bell ringers' annual dinner for many years. More importantly Pat was a very conscientious service ringer and rarely missed a service.

For the last few years she suffered from generalized arthritis and gave ringing tower bells only a few months before her death but continued with the hand bells until a week before she died. Pat was a valuable member of the team and will be sorely missed.

### Middleham Restoration Project: The Story so far...

MIDDLEHAM is part of a cluster of four churches of which two have bells - Middleham and East Witton. A single band of ringers covers both churches. The band was started from scratch 15 or so years ago at East Witton by Tom Oakshott. It now has significant membership at both churches.

The eight bells of the Church of St Mary and St Alkelda, Middleham were installed in 1911 by John Taylor Co., at a cost of £757. They are of outstanding tone and are widely recognised for their fine quality. Taylors told us: "The bells are amongst the finest ever cast in our foundry.

The ringers felt that the bells were not as easy to ring as they would have liked and arranged for Taylors to inspect both belfries. There is nothing wrong with the East Witton that would not be cured by replacing them entirely! And at Middleham, Taylors reported that there were issues concerning the clappers and bearings.

To our delight, there stepped forward a (then) nonringer, Simon Burren, absolute expert at anything to do with construction. Simon not only became our head of engineering but he learned to ring hells, progressing at a speed that astonished me.

Three others, a ringer and two non-ringers, were also enthusiastic so we had a committee of five. We contacted Robert Wood of the Branch and Andrew Aspland (YACR President) who gave us great encouragement and support.

#### Planning the work

With indispensable Andrew, we uninstalled the clappers, took them to Loughborough, retrieved then reinstalled them. Robert Wood got us thinking about replacing the 1911 plain hearings.

It may have helped our thinking when Robert suffered a horrible accident while lubricating the current bearings for a peal. We contacted the CCCBR, we Googled, we talked to people, we obtained quotations and finally sought and obtained PCC approval.

Now we have to raise money £25,000, of which we have £3,310. We have applied for grants from the Branch and YACR restoration funds and are preparing to **launch the public appeal at the church on Friday** evening, 24th March. The choir and the ukulele band are booked, and the local publicity is out.

We have learned much so far, and still have much to learn. We learned that the Branch is hugely supportive and, again, I must single out Robert Wood for his allround help and encouragement.

#### How can you help?

A simple way to donate is through BT's mydonate website but at the time of writing, we are waiting for BT to satisfy themselves that the church is a charity before we go live on the site.

We were pretty sure we could get the girls ringing rounds for the Carol Service perhaps with a little assistance. The girls worked exceptionally hard and we decided to play it safe and just ring backstrokes for the big day. They also chomped their way through the tower's stash of chocolates at an alarming rate but made amends by giving us a Christmas present of a tower tin to be kept under lock and key next year!

The girls were thrilled to be nominated *Women of the Week* at school also school for their efforts which they were thrilled about, it also meant that the whole€ emails the week before the carol service made sure everyone attending the carol s ringing. Suddenly there was a lot of expectation and just a little bit of pressure.

We met at 9:15am for the Carol Service at 10:00am. The cathedral was pretty full even at this early hour. Mrs Cameron (Headmistress) greeted us with Christmas Cards and thank you bottles of wine for the' Tutors. In the ringing chamber we were joined by members of the school teaching staff who had come to see what the girls had been up to. The girls rang rounds on 8 extremely well and we enjoyed some great striking. An excellent result after five lessons, only 1 of which was ringing with the team.

The girls left the tower 5 minutes early whilst we rang the bells down and were greeted with lots of congratulations and high-fives as the made their way to their seats.

All four of the girls Abbie, Evie, Hattie and Martha should be very proud of their achievement.
